

The development of sport policy KEYWORDS in Finland has been characterised by a relatively long-lasting, polarised, Finland; sport policy; sports governance; country profile; and highly politicised sports sector and a series of structural reforms. The contemporary sports system in Finland represents a mixed model, in sports organisation which the state has a strong role in directing sport policy (especially through resource steering), while the role of sports organisations is implementation. Further, municipalities play a central role in creating conditions for sport and physical activity, and all sport policy actors have high autonomy in their operations. In particular, the population's increasing physical inactivity and lack of elite sport success in Finland have driven the central government to seek new solutions, such as centralisation, a crossadministrative approach, and evidence-informed policy-making practices. Sport policy is also impacted by international trends and agreements, such as sustainable development, in which Finland's ambitious goals affect the sports sector. In the future, the unclear roles of different actors and a lack of leadership could cause further challenges to the adoption of effective sport policies.



History and the present: difference, diversity, (racialised) inequalities/ tension

Southall

- a major town in the (West) London Borough of Ealing
- since 1950s proximity to Heathrow and wider global (forced) migration e.g 1972 expulsion of Indian population from Uganda has made it home to large Punjabi/Sikh community
- major South Asian culture (385, 000 residents; 40.4% Asian; 70% Punjabi)
- perjorative descriptions 'Little India'; 'Little Punjab'
- racialised tensions, racism and violence culture of distrust in 'outsiders' and authorities


